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{Message from the Director}-----

The 2003-04 fiscal year was another period of adjustment and realignment of resources for the Alabama State Council on the Arts. The legislative appropriation for FY 04 produced a reduction of 10% or a cut of \$351,000 to the agency's overall budget. This appropriation followed the defeat of the Governor's "Amendment One," calling for a comprehensive tax increase to address pressing needs in state government. The 10% cut was in line with other state agencies in the Education Trust Fund.

As a result of the budget situation, across the board cuts were made in the grants and administrative budget. In the program area where Council goals are addressed, several initiatives were either delayed or eliminated. An ambitious "Black Belt Initiative" was limited to the restructuring of existing programs to serve some Black Belt schools and communities in the greatest areas of need. These efforts included the Rural Schools Touring Program, Camp Shakespeare and special targeted project grants for community development. Technical assistance to arts organizations in the field had to be reserved to top priority needs only. Plans to expand the Artist-in-Schools Program in rural areas were deferred because of the reduction of state funds.

With respect to the agency's "front-line" grants program where the Council responds to hundreds of applications from arts organizations and schools statewide, the impact of the cuts was felt in several ways. Obviously competition in the discipline program areas relative to grant awards was more intense than ever before. Many otherwise worthy projects had to be either under-funded or rejected altogether. Support for all major arts institutions had to be scaled back. Small Technical Assistance grants usually made throughout the year, were eliminated. Start-up grants and support for emerging groups in rural and inner-city areas were severely restricted. Since FY 04 was the third straight

year where budget cuts had to be absorbed, damage control in the grants program was the "order of the day."

During FY 04 Governor Riley appointed four new members to the Council for six-year terms: Julie Hall Friedman from Fairhope, Ralph Frohsin from Alexander City, Dora James Little from Auburn and Vaughan Morrisette from Mobile. Ceil Jenkins Snow was reappointed for a second term. James Scott Sledge of Gadsden concluded a two-year term as Chairman of the Council and Bernice Price of Montgomery assumed the Chair's position becoming the first African-American Chairman of the Council.

Within the Agency's staff, Barbara Edwards, Arts in Education Program Manager for over twenty-years was promoted to the position of Deputy Director. Hank Willett, Director of the Alabama Center of Traditional Culture, retired after twenty-one years of combined service with the agency. Joey Brackner, Folk Arts Program Man-

ager, became the Acting Director of the ACTC. Diana Green was hired as Arts in Education Program Manager, bringing a wealth of experience to that important job.

The resources of state government go through a series of peaks and valleys over time. The 2003-04 year was a lean time and the Council made do with the funds it had to work with. The Council's multi-year plan for growth and development of the arts in Alabama was slowed a bit but is still viable and ready for the next phases of implementation. In fact, an important planning phase for an upgraded software program for grants-management took place in 2003-04. The Black Belt Initiative is being developed and is scheduled for activation in the future. Expanded partnerships are being forged in design arts, folk arts, literature, dance, arts education and other areas where potential is great. When resources are secured, significant progress will take place relative to Council programs and the arts in Alabama.

{Message from the Chair}-----

I am constantly reminded of the plethora of events and experiences that connects us to each other, serving as reminders of what it means to be truly human. I, likewise, find awe-inspiring the significant impact of the arts in those humanizing experiences and in generating a cultural atmosphere imbued with artistic expressions throughout Alabama. Two years ago our budget was cut, necessitating cuts in grants to arts organizations. I am, however, amazed, yet gratified, by the innovative ways arts organizations throughout Alabama have used resourceful venues to strive to make the arts accessible to those who might not otherwise be exposed, formally or informally. Not only have those organizations, despite funding cuts, been successful in keeping the arts vibrant, they have been successful in keeping them relevant. Their successes have been manifest in diverse ways: the amazement and wonder on the faces of children as they view art works, watch dancers, or travel imaginatively with actors; the pain, yet exhilaration, expressed by incarcerated boys and girls as they read excerpts from their published works; or the excitement generated as children listen to storytellers or participate in choral singing. Visual artists, writers, dancers, musicians, and theatrical performers are portals, opening doors for their

audiences. We have felt the music reverberating in our hearts and minds; we have seen visuals reach out and speak to us; we have moved with dancers to new heights; we have been led to explore and examine ideas and realities on the printed page; and, we have taken wondrous journeys with theatrical performers. If it were not for the interest and financial support of the legislature, arts organizations could not present various artistic renderings to the communities in Alabama. Additional organizations have arts programs and projects that would benefit from funding. Sadly, our current appropriations do not allow us to fund them. When we have been faced with challenging budget cuts, the staff, managers, deputy director, director and the Council have responded in a concerted and positive manner.

When state and local budgets face tremendous cuts, often the response by some is to eliminate the arts or reduce funding to a bare minimum. My response is, "We cannot afford to eliminate the arts which are so vitally important." If we want to enhance the quality of life, if we want something that embraces the very essence of the human experience, we must continue to support artists and the means by which they express that essence.



{Arts Education}-----

The goal of the **Arts in Education Program** is to provide opportunities for Alabama students to experience excellence in the arts and develop competency in artistic expression as part of their education. Additionally, the goal is to support the professional development of teachers and the involvement of artists and arts organization in this process.

In FY 2004, the Council addressed this goal through its grants program and through partnerships with other organizations. Financial support was provided for artist residencies, school-based projects, presenting activities and partnership activities. These funds supported art education activities for rural, underserved, and inner city students, students with disabilities and incarcerated youth.

There were a number of partnership programs with other organizations that supported arts education. These programs offered opportunities for individual students and teachers and brought events into schools. The **Visual Arts Achievement Program**, a partnership program of the Council, local arts organizations and institutions of higher learning, recognized the artistic talent of over 800 visual arts students in grades 6-12 and provided financial support to a

limited number of high school seniors to continue their study of the visual arts.

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The **Imaginative Learning Workshop**, a partnership program of the Alabama Alliance for Arts Education and the Council, provided a hands-on, participatory, summer workshop for classroom teachers, art specialists and teaching artists. The focus of this summer program was on the development of thematic units of study for grades pre-K-12. Another partnership program focused on professional development for classroom teachers and teaching artists was the Alabama Institute for Education in the Arts Summer Arts Institute. This six-day intense study of arts integration was based on disciplined based arts education.

The Council was able to reach rural and underserved schools through Camp Shakespeare in the

Schools and the Rural School Touring Program.

Camp Shakespeare was a **partnership program** of the Alabama Shakespeare Festival and the Council. Students from three schools were introduced to the works of William Shakespeare through a variety of classes ranging from acting to technical theatre. The five-day, in-school camp culminated with a student production at each of the participating schools. Through the **Rural School Touring Program**, 8,867 students were given an opportunity to see a live professional performance.

In addition to the above partnerships, the Council worked at the state level with the **Alabama Alliance for Arts Education** and the **Alabama State Department of Education** on the promotion of comprehensive arts education for every student. These organizations as well as the **Alabama Institute for Education in the Arts** and the organizations of arts education specialists are working together to revise the standards for arts education.

The Council strongly believes that the arts are the "critical links" to student success and has used its resources during FY 2004 to support arts education activities in schools statewide.



{Community Arts}-----

The **Community Arts Program** addresses the needs of a variety of organizations across Alabama. From urban to rural, from cultural arts centers to local arts councils, from main street programs to social service organizations, this program's multi-disciplinary focus supports many of the state's diverse resources.

Operating support is provided to larger art councils and art centers to encourage a strong relationship between communities and local governments where the arts are considered an important economic development tool. These organizations represent the state's urban centers and also reflect their diverse community needs. Local arts groups that are supported are as diverse as the Tuscaloosa Art Council, which operates the Bama Theatre and its varied programs, and the Mobile Arts Council with its unique community services.

To help community arts organizations that may have no permanent staff, the Council offers **Programming Development Grants**. These grants are implemented in a three-year program designed to assist volunteer organizations in adding paid staff to stabilize growth and development. One such grantee was

The Coleman Center in York, which is in its second year of the program and now has its first full-time executive director.

Community Planning and Design is a unique program established to support projects that use the design arts to impact the quality of life in Alabama communities.

The Multi-discipline Project and Festivals and Project Assistance Program addresses the needs of a variety of programs and organizations that have diverse and multicultural missions. Grants include small community festivals such as the Turkey Trot Festival in Collinsville and the Piney Woods Festival in Enterprise, as well as larger festivals like Panoply in Huntsville. Alabama's communities have a variety of needs. This component of the Community Arts program supported an after-school arts and tutoring program in Hayneville, an annual, summer arts camp in Talladega, and locally produced plays about community history in Brundidge

and Union Springs. Other innovative and unique activities that were supported include the Missoula Children's Theatre in Tallassee and the Moscow Chamber Orchestra in Livingston.

Community Planning and Design is a unique program that supports projects that use the design arts to impact the quality of life in Alabama communities. Supported in this program in 2003-04 were architectural plans for the adaptive reuse of Church Street School in Andalusia and a landscape design for Decatur's Delano Park. Design Alabama, a statewide organization that promotes awareness and appreciation of all the design disciplines, is supported as a significant partner in Community Planning and Design.

The Individual Artist Fellowship Program provides awards to designers in recognition of artistic excellence as well as professional commitment to design arts and to the state. Awards in 2003-04 went to Jake Sanders, an architect with the Rural Studio in Greensboro, and Erin Wright, a graphic designer and professor at the University of Alabama – Birmingham.



{Folklife}-----

The Alabama Center for Traditional Culture and Alabama Folklife Program

The folklife division of ASCA consists of a research and production office called the Alabama Center for Traditional Culture and a grants-making office called the Alabama Folklife Program. Both programs work in concert to identify, preserve, and present Alabama folk arts and traditions.

Alabama folklife consists of those aspects of our state's culture which are traditional, and are learned within communities from generation to generation. As a result, these cultural traditions reflect community values and aesthetics. Folklife includes folk arts such as traditional crafts, music and dance, as well as, regional foodways, folk architecture, beliefs, storytelling, myths, and medicinal practices, etc. Folklife is regional, reflecting the process of adaptation by various ethnic groups to a geographical area. Because it is a product of an historical and geographical process, Alabama folklife, in its many facets, uniquely reflects the personality of our state and its communities.

Through the staff of the ***Alabama Center for Traditional Culture***, ASCA works to identify folk

traditions and present them through educational products such as documentary CDs, traveling exhibits, lectures, and publications. Folklife topics represent a large part of the content of the Alabama Arts Radio series which is produced by the Center.

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The Alabama Folklife Program

offers grant support to non-profit organizations for a wide range of projects seeking to present and preserve the state's folk culture.

Examples of these projects include:

- Documentation and presentation of Alabama folklife through media such as film, video, photography, recordings, radio and publications.
- Festivals which present folklife and involve community-based folk artists.
- Field Surveys that identify and document Alabama folk traditions and practitioners.

- The presentation of Alabama folk artists in performance or exhibition.
- Educational materials such as curriculum guides and other resources that will further the understanding of Alabama folklife in a classroom setting.
- An organization assisting a folk artist with a project to further his or her tradition.
- Fee subsidies for no more than 50 percent of total cash expenses for booking performances of traditional artists from Alabama or elsewhere.

Folk Art Apprenticeship grants are given to master folk artists for teaching their art form. Prospective students who have entered into an agreement with a master folk artist may also apply for an Apprenticeship grant. Apprenticeships are one of the primary "preservation" tools of the Alabama Folklife Program. They are designed to ensure the transmission of a diversity of folk skills from Sacred Harp singing to pottery-making, using the traditional master-apprenticeship system.

The Alabama Folk Heritage Award recognizes an outstanding traditional artist every other year as part of ASCA's Governor's Arts Awards program. The last two

winner were Bo McGee, a blues artist from Greene County and Jerry Brown a folk potter from Hamilton.

Accomplishments in Folklife during 2003-2004:

The Alabama Arts Radio

Series -- Steve Grauberger continues to produce ASCA's weekly radio series "Alabama Arts" on the Southeastern Public Radio Network. We have recently agreed to a new season of 26 half-hour programs featuring interviews by ASCA staff with a variety of artists from around the state.

Music Tour -- The Alabama Jubilee Concerts was an NEA-sponsored tour of Alabama traditional music. The artists included Jerry "Boogie" McCain, a blues musician from Gadsden, the Gary Waldrep Band, a bluegrass ensemble from Kilpatrick, the Birmingham Sunlights gospel quartet and the Mariachi Garibaldi of Montgomery. The tour performed in Montgomery, Dothan, Gadsden, Selma, and Boaz.

Alabama Arts Magazine -- The Center Staff coordinated a special

folklife issue of *Alabama Arts*. The issue is a part of a special series on cultural tourism in Alabama. The articles written by Joyce Cauthen, Steve Grauberger, Anne Kimzey, Carol Zippert, Joey Brackner, and Al Head emphasize the traditional arts in Alabama.

Latin American Survey -- We are in the early stages of a project to research Hispanic/Latin American culture in the state. This survey is funded by an NEA Folk Arts grant.

Traditional Musics of Alabama Recording Series -- The primary music documentation project for the Center for Traditional Culture is an ongoing CD series called *Traditional Musics of Alabama* produced by Steve Grauberger.


Volume 4: Traditional Musics of Alabama: Wiregrass Notes Revised, is planned but not yet released. It will be a reissue of the 1980 LP recording with additional recorded material digitally mastered from the original master tapes.

Tributaries: The Journal of the Alabama Folklife Association, Issue No. 7, 2004, included articles on *Picking Mayhews*, *Black Mardi Gras in Mobile*, and *Stereotypes in Short Stories of Ruby Pickens Tartt*.

Shape Note singings -- These events bring together singers from around the country, celebrating Alabama's four shape note hymnbooks. *The Archive of Alabama Folk Culture* is an initiative with the *Alabama Folklife Association* and the Alabama State Council on the Arts to create a permanent archive of Alabama folk materials at the *Alabama Department of Archives and History*.

Hank Willett Retires -- Folklorist Hank Willett, who directed the Alabama Center for Traditional Culture since 1990, retired in December 2003. Hank intends to remain active in special projects near his new home in Mentone, Alabama.



{Literature}-----

The goal of the **Literary Arts Program** is to increase public awareness of and exposure to literature and the state's literary heritage and to support contemporary Alabama writers of creative non-fiction, fiction, and poetry, and other literary genres. The Literary Arts Program accomplishes this by providing a variety of grant components enabling organizations and communities to share in the literary wealth that this state offers.

Presenting grants support readings and presentations by authors in a variety of venues around the state and put writers in direct contact with readers and their communities. A partner in this mission is the Auburn University Center for the Arts and Humanities, whose Alabama Voices program brings writers to communities for readings, workshops, school programs, and other literary events. They co-sponsor events with local host and partner organizations such as schools, libraries and local arts councils in communities large and small across the state.

Project grants provide support for a wide range of activities that include conferences and festivals such as the Alabama Writers Symposium held annually in Monroeville on the campus of Alabama Southern Community College. This event provides

an opportunity for readers and writers alike to hear contemporary writers and scholars speak and read. Providing funds for literary journals is yet another way this program seeks to expand the opportunities for writers in the state.

The **individual artist fellowship program** provides awards to writers in recognition of artistic excellence as well as professional commitment to literary arts and to their state. FY 2004 awards went to Priscilla Hancock Cooper, a poet from Birmingham who is working on a collection of her work and Charles Rose from Auburn who plans to use

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his fellowship to travel and research material for a new novel.

The Literary Arts Program has a long-term collaborative partnership with the **Alabama Writers' Forum**, a statewide service organization that promotes Alabama writers and writing. The Forum has many collaborators as well, including the Alabama Center for the Book, Alabama Southern Community College (where the annual Harper Lee Award for Alabama's Distinguished writer is awarded), numerous other community colleges, public libraries, and literary festivals. The Forum publishes *First Draft*, a quarterly journal of literary news, maintains a website (www.writersforum.org), and recognizes young Alabama writers, as well as their teachers and schools, in the High School Literary Arts Awards.

Since 1997, the Forum has partnered with the Alabama Department of Youth Services to create "Writing Our Stories: An Anti-Violence Creative Writing Program." In this unique program, published writers work with incarcerated youth to develop their creative writing skills. Each year three anthologies of student work are published. "Writing Our Stories" is becoming known nationally as a model juvenile justice and the arts program.



{Performing Arts}-----

Music, Dance and Theatre arts are supported together under the **Performing Arts Program**. The goal is to ensure that high quality performances are available to Alabama audiences by supporting the state's performing arts organizations, presenters and artists. There are six grant components that serve to deliver their programs and services to Alabama communities.

Presenting grants allow organizations to engage artists and companies from other parts of the state, the country and the world, bringing the best of the performing arts to Alabama. Performances supported by state funds this year include the Paul Taylor Dance Company and Russian National Ballet in Huntsville, Verdi Opera Company in Anniston, Orpheus Quartet and Los Angeles Piano Quartet in Auburn and Ballet Hispanico and Sweet Honey in the Rock in Birmingham. One criterion vital to the success of each presenter application is inclusion of educational outreach programs where, for example, artists perform for school audiences or offer a master class for student musicians, dancers or actors.

Project grants provide support for producing, commissioning, planning process and touring, with

educational components again being a priority for Council funding. Applicants are primarily community theatres, orchestras, choirs and dance companies. Southern Danceworks in Birmingham provided an opportunity for wheelchair-bound individuals to audition and take workshops culminating in a performance experience entitled "Burn Rubber." Mobile's Singing Children conducted a 7-day tour to 6 communities including performances in nursing homes.

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Zelpha's Cultural Development Corporation provides on-going music lessons for 150 underserved students in Tuscaloosa, and Tuskegee Repertory Theatre mounted an original work

in tribute to Sammy Young, a Tuskegee Institute student, the first college student murdered during the Civil Rights Movement.

Operating Support grants provide greatly needed unrestricted funds to the state's largest institutions. Performing arts organizations must have a three-year average budget of \$350,000 in order to qualify for this program, where a percentage of their average is awarded. They must also match the grant amount in city and/or county funding, and have a full-time artistic and administrative staff. There were ten organizations statewide funded under this component in fiscal year 2004.

There are three organizations funded under **Collaborative Ventures** that provide services and programs with statewide impact. **The Alabama Dance Council** distributes a newsletter, provides technical assistance to dance companies, and coordinates the annual **Alabama Dance Summit**, bringing dancers and companies together from throughout the state for professional training, study and performance opportunities. **The Alabama Conference of Theatre** serves high school, college and university and community theatre

programs through their newsletter and annual festivals. The Council supports the Southern Writers' Project of the Alabama Shakespeare Festival that provides opportunities for the development and production of new works based on the broad range of Southern experience.

Two community theatres were supported through the **Program Development grants** component this year. Mobile Theatre Guild received its third year of this three-year grant program to secure administrative staff and public relations functions. The Whole Backstage in Guntersville received its second year of funding to support administrative staff as they work to fund and implement a multi-year, multi-million dollar renovation to their facility.

The Council supports individual artists through the **Fellowship Program**, which recognizes and rewards the state's most promising and accomplished artists. In dance one award was made to emerging choreographer Janie Allen Alford to support the creation of new work; in music one award was made to blues legend Willie King; and in theatre two awards were made to playwright Jeanmarie Collins and ventriloquist and children's performer Darrell Revel. Another way that the Council supports artists is by engaging them to participate in the **Rural School Touring Program**, a component of the Arts-In-Education Program.



{Visual Arts}-----

The goal of the **Visual Arts Program** is to ensure that excellence, professionalism and multicultural expressions are available to Alabama audiences in the disciplines of painting, sculpture, crafts, printmaking, photography and film. The program supports the state's museums, exhibition spaces, art centers, artists and community projects with visual art and craft programming.

Presenting grants allow organizations to bring exhibitions from other parts of the state, country or world, providing diverse experiences for the viewing audience. **Project grants** provide support to organize exhibitions, commission public artworks, provide art classes for both children and adults, include visual arts in community festivals, and offer professional development opportunities for artists. The Metal Arts Program of Sloss Furnaces in Birmingham provides a unique opportunity for professional and emerging artists as well as high school students to create sculpture with cast iron, bringing artists from throughout the world to Alabama. In South Alabama the Centre for the Living Arts and Gulf ArtSpace established exhibition opportunities for young contemporary artists, providing unique experiences and educational opportunity for the general public as well. The Akron

Boys and Girls Club, Irondale Senior Center, Children's Museum of the Shoals and Studio by the Tracks in Birmingham provided art classes for audiences ranging from at-risk youth to autistic adults to senior adults. The Kentuck Museum Association in Northport organized exhibitions in such diverse public spaces such as the newspaper office and a Visitor's Center. The Sidewalk Moving Image Festival in Birmingham plans opportunities in film making and viewing for K-12 students as well as independent artists and the general public.

The Visual Arts Program also refers artists to juried exhibitions, festivals, and teaching opportunities as well as responding to public requests for artists with particular skills.

Operating Support grants provide unrestricted funds to the state's largest museums. To qualify, these organizations must have a three-year average cash income of at least \$500,000 and receive a percentage of this average. Art museums in

Huntsville, Birmingham, Montgomery, and Mobile were funded under this component in fiscal year 2004.

The **Alabama Craft Council** is funded under a **Collaborative Venture** in the Visual Arts. The organization provides communication, education, and technical assistance to artists, also sponsoring the annual Alabama Clay Conference/Alabama Craft Conference.

The Council provides **Artist Fellowships** to individuals in the visual arts based on merit of work, career achievement, career potential and service to the state. 2004 recipients were Steve Ashlee for film production; quilter Murray Johnson for development of new designs; ceramist Charles Smith for study of African and Native American pottery forms; Mario Gallardo, Anne Howard, Amy Pleasant, and Sonja Rieger for career development.

The Visual Arts Program also refers artists to juried exhibitions, festivals, and teaching opportunities as well as responding to public requests for artists with particular skills. The **Alabama Artists Gallery** at the offices of the Council organizes exhibitions to bring visibility, promotion and career opportunities much needed by the state's artists.
