



{Message from the Director}-----

Fiscal year 2005 could be characterized by the proverbial, “good news bad news” story. The good news is, that the Council’s 2004-05 budget was not cut (for the first time in three years), thus, allowing the agency to operate without a reduction in grant support or services. The bad news is that the Council’s 2004-05 budget was not increased, yet again, postponing progress on some important priorities. My assessment for the year, however, will be the more positive one and I will endeavor to highlight some important events and noteworthy progress.

A position of optimism relative to state support of the arts is reinforced by the action of the Legislature during the 2005 Session. The State Council on the Arts budget for FY06 was approved at \$3,906,103, a \$700,000 increase. The primary components for the increase included funding for a Black Belt initiative, providing greater operating support for major cultural institutions and expanding support in project-oriented grant programs. The increase will also open the door for progressive planning and moving ahead with designing new programs. It should be noted that the Governor’s new “Smart Budgeting” program greatly enhanced the Council’s ability to make its case for funding important programs that are part of a long-range plan.

In the fall of 2004, the Council engaged in a partnership with the Governor’s Office and the Helen Keller Sculpture Committee to commission a major sculpture of Helen Keller to be placed in Statuary Hall in the US Capitol. Helen Keller will not only represent Alabama, but will be the first to represent the disabled population in Statuary Hall. Unveiling ceremonies in Tusculumbia, Keller’s birthplace, and Washing-

ton DC are scheduled for the summer and early fall of 2006. First Lady Patsy Riley serves as chair of the committee and has provided significant leadership in all phases of the project.

Program planning and reassessment were major areas of endeavor for the agency in 2004-05. The Council staff facilitated focus-group meetings around the state to solicit input regarding the effectiveness of current programs, community and organizational needs, and issues affecting the arts in Alabama. Arts in education, reaching underserved audiences, supporting artistic excellence, preserving cultural traditions, cultural facility enhancement and promoting cultural tourism all surfaced as priorities for increased attention. The culmination of the planning process will be the printing of an up-dated “Blueprint for Supporting the Arts” document that will articulate goals, objectives and specific strategies advancing not only the arts, but, the entire state.

In April 2005, Alabama art and artists were showcased in New York City. Under the coordination and leadership of Nall Hollis, Alabama native and internationally recognized artist, over two-dozen Alabama visual and literary artists were introduced to New York audiences. Activities took place at two venues, one at the historic New York Art Club and the other at 55 Water Street, an RSA-owned office building in the financial district of lower Manhattan. In addition to the sponsorship by the Nall Art Foundation, state sponsors included the Retirement Systems of Alabama, Troy University, the State Council on the Arts, the State Bureau of Tourism and Travel, Alabama Southern Community College and the Alabama Writers’ Forum. The hugely successful, two-day event received

broad media coverage, and was supported by over three hundred Alabamians who came to New York.

The Council, in May 2005, presented its biennial State-wide Arts Awards Program at the Davis Theatre in Montgomery. The recipients included: Mrs. Gloria Narramore Moody, Lifetime Achievement; George Lindsey, Distinguished Artist; Vestal Goodman, Hall of Honor Award; Betty Grisham, Bobby Horton and Jimmy Lee Sudduth, Governor's Award; and Margie and Enoch Sullivan, Folk Heritage Award. First Lady Patsy Riley, members of the Legislature, and over five hundred individuals representing communities large and small, diverse arts organizations, and friends of the recipients attended the event.

The Council continued its sponsorship of the Bill Bates Leadership Institute which provides an opportunity for arts professionals from throughout the state to gather and consider broad issues impacting the arts and in areas where the arts can enhance our state. In 2005, the Council expanded the institute concept to include the Black Belt region where professional development, organizational growth and promoting growth and promoting indigenous cultural resources are needed.

The Council staff experienced one major change with the leaving of long-time performing arts program manager, Rebecca Ryals. Replacing Ms. Ryals, Yvette Daniel came to the Council in March 2005 as a seasoned professional with a strong background in theatre and arts administration. Joey Brackner was appointed permanent director of the Alabama Center for Traditional Culture, advancing from acting director to that position. Also, as part of the internal operations of the agency, the Council converted its grants management system to a new and more sophisticated software program. The upgraded system will allow the agency to greatly expand its information collection and dissemination capacity.

At the close of FY2005, there are clear signs of forward movement within the state with respect to the growth, appreciation and impact of the arts. The arts are increasingly being seen as a vehicle to enhance education, economic development, community revitalization, cultural/heritage tourism and the overall quality of life for all Alabamians. The arts are one of Alabama's most valuable human resources and an integral part of plans for progress statewide.

{Message from the Chair}-----

In a profound way, the arts speak to us. They bid us to see and hear; they invite us to sing and dance. They provoke laughter and tears, joy and pain; they remind us of who we are, what we are, and what we might become. They are often bridges connecting us to where we have been and to the path that lies before us. The arts have a unique way of cajoling and, at times, moving us to act and feel beyond ourselves. Even in the midst of tragedy and horrific devastation, the arts have a way of reminding us of the value of humanity, the value of life. How fortunate we are in Alabama to have such a varied, wide-range of art vehicles that do indeed elevate us and illuminate much that otherwise might go unappreciated and unseen.

Since the arts are such an invaluable part of our lives, it is incumbent upon all of us: artists, patrons, consumers, and promoters, to keep the arts alive. The Council

has made a commitment to do so. We urge you to continue to do so by using one of the most effective tools available-- advocacy. While appropriations to the arts have increased,

all of us must continue to urge the governor, the legislature, and the community to continue their investment in the arts. We must ensure that the arts are accessible to all; further, we must encourage all children in their exploration of, understanding of, and appreciation for the arts; we must help them realize the extraordinary potential for all of us to make a better world, whether through music, dance, painting, crafts, or literature.

Through the arts, we must strive to inculcate in children and young adults the idea that they can learn and do whatever their talents permit, and to dream and be all that they can be. If we commit ourselves to these goals, then there will be evidence that we have truly heard, seen, and experienced the arts.

{Arts in Education}-----

The goal of the **Arts in Education Program** has four components: 1) to provide opportunities for Alabama students to learn in, through and about the arts, 2) to ensure the arts as an integral and essential component of education in the State of Alabama, 3) to provide professional development opportunities for Alabama artists, educators and administrators in arts curriculum development, and 4) to support partnerships between schools, artists and arts organizations that foster excellence in arts education.

In FY 2005, the Council was able to support educational programs in dance, music, theatre, visual arts, creative writing and multi-disciplinary arts through its grants programs. Presenting grants, school-based project grants, artist residencies and partnerships provided funding for innovative and inclusive programming throughout the State including rural, underserved, and inner city students, students with disabilities and incarcerated youth.

The **Visual Arts Achievement Program**, which is a partnership between the Council, local arts organizations and institutions of higher learning, recognized the artistic talent of over 800 visual arts students in grades 6-12 and provided financial support to a limited number of high school seniors to continue their study of the visual arts. The **Imaginative Learning Workshop**, a partnership

between the Alabama Alliance for Arts Education and the Council, provided two three-day summer workshops for classroom teachers, art specialists and teaching artists, exploring integrated arts lesson plans for programs K-6 and 7-12. The Alabama Institute for Education in the Arts provided a **Summer Arts Institute** focused on professional development for classroom teachers, administrators and teaching artists in an intensive six-day workshop in arts integration with a focus on content in dance, music, theatre and visual arts.

During **Camp Shakespeare**, a partnership between the Alabama Shakespeare Festival and the Council, students from three schools in Russell and Cherokee Counties were introduced to the works of William Shakespeare through a variety of classes ranging from acting to technical theatre. The five-day, in-school camps culminated with a student production of *Taming of the Shrew* at each of the participating schools.

Through the Council's **Rural School Touring Program**, 32 schools in 22 counties were treated to a total of 40 live performances by Birmingham Children's Theatre, Eric Essix's Jazz Ensemble, Dancing Story Lady, Nathifa Dance Company, Southern Danceworks and Gary Waldrep's Band.

In FY 2004 the *Convocation on Emerging Trends in Arts Education* was held as a collaborative venture sponsored and conducted by the Council, the **Alabama Alliance for Arts Education**, the **Alabama State Department of Education**, and the **Alabama Institute for Education in the Arts**. In FY 2005, a report was generated with recommendations regarding curriculum, instructional strategies, professional development, advocacy and research. As a result of this collaboration, **Arts Are Core** was formed under the umbrella of the **Alabama Alliance for Arts Education**. This grass roots organization is working to support stronger arts programs in communities throughout the State.

The Council strongly believes that the arts are the "critical links" to student success and has used its resources during FY 2005 to support arts education activities in schools statewide. A planning and research phase has begun for an arts education initiative that will support fully integrated arts curriculums at one or more model schools by FY 2007.



{Community Arts}-----

The **Community Arts Program** addresses the needs of a variety of organizations across Alabama. From urban to rural, from cultural arts centers to local arts councils, from main street programs to social service organizations, this program's multi-disciplinary focus supports many of the state's diverse resources.

Operating support is provided to larger art councils and art centers to encourage a strong relationship between communities and local governments where the arts are considered essential to the quality of life, and, also is an important economic development tool. These organizations represent the state's urban centers and also reflect their diverse community needs. Local Arts Councils that are supported by the Council are as diverse as the Tuscaloosa Art Council, which operates the Bama Theatre and its varied programs, and Art Centers such as the Mary G. Hardin Center for the Cultural Arts in Gadsden, which operates exciting year-round programs for the community.

To help community arts organizations that may have no permanent staff, the Council offers **Programming Development grants**. These grants are implemented in a three-year program designed to assist volunteer organizations in adding paid staff to stabilize growth and development. One such grantee is The Coleman Center in York, which is in their third year of the program.


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The Multi-discipline Project and Festivals Project Assistance Program addresses the needs of a variety of programs and organizations that have diverse and multicultural missions. Grants include small community festivals like the First Annual Alabama Chicken and Egg Festival in Moulton, sponsored by the Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce as well

as larger festivals like Panoply in Huntsville. Alabama's communities come in a wide variety of shapes and sizes and each one is unique and special to the people that live there. The Community Arts program tries to address this community diversity by supporting projects such as a community Jazz Festival in Daphne and a Songwriter's Festival in Guntersville.

Community Planning and Design is a unique program established to support projects that use the design arts to impact the quality of life in Alabama communities. Supported under this program were architectural plans for the adaptive reuse of Church Street School in Andalusia and a landscape design for Decatur's Delano Park. One of our statewide partnership organizations is **Design Alabama**, a non-profit organization that promotes awareness and appreciation of all the design disciplines. This organization's advocacy makes a valuable contribution to the quality of life and economic well-being of the state.

The **Individual Artist Fellowship Program** in community arts provides awards to designers and arts administrators in recognition of artistic excellence, as well as professional commitment to the state. Fellowships awarded during FY05 went to Jack D. Sanders of Greensboro for Design Arts; Erin Dean Wright of Birmingham for Graphic Design, and Christina Littlejohn of Mobile for Arts Administration.



{Folklife}-----

The Alabama Center for Traditional Culture and Alabama Folklife Program

The **Alabama Center for Traditional Culture** is the folklife division of ASCA. The Center is both a grants-making office and research team working to identify, preserve, and present Alabama folk arts and traditions.

Alabama folklife consists of those aspects of our state's culture which are traditional, and are learned within communities from generation to generation. As a result, these cultural traditions reflect community values and aesthetics. Folklife includes folk arts such as traditional crafts, music and dance, as well as regional foodways, folk architecture, beliefs, storytelling, myths, and medicinal practices, etc. Folklife is regional, reflecting the process of adaptation by various ethnic groups to a geographical area. Because it is a product of an historical and geographical process, Alabama folklife, in its many facets, uniquely reflects the personality of our state and its communities.

Through the staff of the **Alabama Center for Traditional Culture**, ASCA works to identify folk traditions and present them through educational products such as documentary CDs, traveling exhibits, lectures, and publications. Folklife topics represent

a large part of the content of the "Alabama Arts" Radio Series which is produced by the Center.

The Centers' folklife **project grants** support non-profit organizations in a wide range of projects seeking to present and preserve the state's folk culture.

Examples of these projects include:

- Documentation and presentation of Alabama folklife through media such as film, video, photography, recordings, radio and publications.
- Festivals which present folklife and involve community-based folk artists.
- Field Surveys that identify and document Alabama folk traditions and practitioners.
- The presentation of Alabama folk artists in performance or exhibition.

- Educational materials such as curriculum guides and other resources that will further the understanding of Alabama folklife in a classroom setting.
- An organization assisting a folk artist with a project to further his or her tradition.
- Fee subsidies for no more than 50 percent of total cash expenses for booking performances of traditional artists from Alabama or elsewhere.

Folk Art Apprenticeship grants are given to master folk artists for teaching their art form. Prospective students who have entered into an agreement with a master folk artist may also apply for an Apprenticeship grant. Apprenticeships are one of the primary "preservation" tools of the Alabama Folklife Program. They are designed to ensure the transmission of a diversity of folk skills from Sacred Harp singing to pottery-making, using the traditional master-apprenticeship system.

The **Alabama Folk Heritage Award** recognizes an outstanding traditional artist every other year as part of ASCA's Governor's Arts Awards program. The last two winners were Jerry Brown, a folk potter from Hamilton, and bluegrass gospel musicians Margie and Enoch Sullivan of Saint Stephens.

Accomplishments in Folklife during 2004-2005:

The ***Alabama Arts Radio Series*** — Steve Grauberger continues to produce ASCA’s weekly radio series “Alabama Arts” on the Southeastern Public Radio Network. We have recently agreed to a new season of 26 half-hour programs featuring interviews by ASCA staff with a variety of artists from around the state.





Latin American Survey — This project researched Hispanic/Latin American culture in the state. The fieldwork and resulting report were supported by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). The Alabama Latin American Association was a partner in the project.

Traditional Musics of Alabama Recording Series — The primary music documentation project for the Center for Traditional Culture is an ongoing CD series called Traditional Musics of Alabama produced by Steve Grauberger.

Volume 4: Traditional Musics of Alabama: Wiregrass Notes Revised was released in 2005. It is a reissue of the 1980 LP recording with additional recorded material digitally mastered from the original master tapes.

Tributaries: The Journal of the Alabama Folklife Association, Issue No. 8, 2005, includes articles on Mobile cuisine, Alabama women blues artists, Sacred Harp singing, and Mexicans in Alabama.



{Literature}-----

The **Literary Arts Program** increases public awareness of and exposure to literature and the state's literary heritage, and supports contemporary Alabama writers of creative non-fiction, fiction, poetry, and other literary genres. The Literary Arts Program provides a variety of grant components enabling organizations and communities to share in the literary wealth that Alabama offers.

Presenting grants support readings and presentations by authors in a variety of venues around the state and put writers in direct contact with readers and their communities. One partner in this mission is the Auburn University Center for the Arts and Humanities, whose Alabama Voices program brings writers to communities for readings, workshops, school programs, and other literary events. The Center co-sponsors events with local host and partner organizations such as schools, libraries and local arts councils in communities large and small across the state.

Project grants provide support for a wide range of activities that include conferences and festivals such as the Alabama Writers Symposium held annually in Monroeville on the campus of Alabama Southern Community College. This event provides an opportunity for readers and writers alike to hear contemporary writers read and practicing scholars speak.

Providing funds for literary journals, book review broadcast programs, and innovative literary programs are further ways that project grants expand the opportunities for writers and readers in the state.

The **individual artist fellowship program** provides awards to writers in recognition of artistic excellence as well as professional commitment to literary arts and to their state. Fellowships during FY05 were given to Charles S. Rose of Auburn for fiction writing and Priscilla Cooper of Birmingham for poetry.

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The Literary Arts Program has a long-term collaborative partnership with the **Alabama Writers' Forum**, a statewide service organization located in Montgomery that promotes Alabama writers and writing. In turn, the Forum has many collaborators, including the Alabama Center for the Book, Alabama Southern Community College (where the Harper Lee Award for Alabama's Distinguished writer is awarded annually), numerous other community colleges, four-year institutions, public libraries, and literary festivals. The Forum publishes *First Draft*, a journal of literary news, maintains a Web site (www.writersforum.org), and recognizes young Alabama writers, as well as their teachers and schools, in the High School Literary Arts Awards.

Since 1997, the Forum has partnered with the Alabama Department of Youth Services to administer Writing Our Stories: An Anti-Violence Creative Writing Program. In this unique program, published writers work with incarcerated youth to develop their creative writing skills. Each year three anthologies of student work are published. "Writing Our Stories" is nationally recognized as a model juvenile justice and the arts program, and its *Curriculum Guide* is in use in other Alabama high schools as well as several states including Mississippi and New Hampshire.



{Performing Arts}-----

The Alabama State Council on the Arts supports the rights of all Alabamians to access and experience the power of the arts and culture through Music, Dance and Theatre.

The **Performing Arts Program** is dedicated to preserving and expanding the rich and diverse artistic endeavors of performing art organizations, presenters, and the individual artist whose endeavors contribute to the quality of life in Alabama communities. There are **six core categories** of support, which allow the **Performing Arts Program** to achieve its mission through its grant-making activity.

Collaborative Ventures grants are made to organizations for advancing the performing field in all areas of artistry, management and production. Support is provided primarily to high impact organizations with broad statewide services and is administered as a partnership agreement. Three organizations have been recognized by ASCA under this category: **The Alabama Conference of Theatre, The Alabama Dance Council and the Alabama Shakespeare Festival.**

The Alabama Conference of Theatre serves high school, college/university and community theatre programs through their newsletter and annual festivals.

The Alabama Dance Council distributes a newsletter, provides technical assistance to dance companies, and coordinates an annual

statewide dance summit, bringing dancers, companies and industry professionals together for unique training and performance experiences.

The Council supports the Southern Writers' Project of the **Alabama Shakespeare Festival** that provides opportunities for the development and production of new works based on the broad range of Southern experiences.

Operating Support grants provide greatly needed unrestricted funds to the state's largest institutions. Performing arts organizations must have a three-year average budget of \$350,000 in order to qualify for this program, where a percentage of their average is awarded. They must also match the grant amount in city and/or county funding, and have a full-time

artistic and administrative staff. There were twelve organizations statewide receiving Operating Support for FY05. Some of those organizations include the Birmingham Children's Theatre, The Huntsville Symphony Orchestra and the Mobile Ballet.

These Operating Support grants are designed to support organizations that demonstrate a consistent track record of high artistic achievement, public service, and managerial competency. Eligible organizations are expected to also have a well-maintained educational outreach program.

Program Development grants provide funding to organizations that have responsibly undertaken the task to meet both market and industry challenges. Recommended organizations in this category may be funded for up to three years. The Whole Backstage, Inc. (Guntersville, Marshall County), and Alabama Contemporary Dance Company (Mobile, Mobile County), are the two such organizations that met the criteria of this granting year.

Whole Backstage, Inc. planned and renovated their space into a multi-year, multi-million dollar facility. The recently completed complex seats 333 patrons and has played to sellout crowds for the last 13 performances. The grant to Alabama Contemporary Dance Company stabilized their organizational structure by adding a full-time Artistic/Managing Director.



{*Performing Arts (continued)*}

Projects grants provide support to performing arts organizations for strategic planning, producing, commissioning, and touring; with ventures with educational components being a priority for Council funding. Grantees in this category include the Shoals Symphony Orchestra (Florence) to mount a public awareness campaign; the Birmingham Music Alliance (Birmingham) to create a new program designed to present music written for young audiences; and Zelpha's Cultural Development Corporation (Tuscaloosa) to provide on-going music lessons for 150 underserved students citywide.

Presenting grants allow organizations to engage artists and companies from other counties, states

or nations to encourage the growth of professional performing arts in Alabama. Presenters recognized in this category have a strong educational component structured into the engagement wherein the artists may perform for school audiences or offer master classes for student musicians, dancers or actors. Grantees in this category during FY05 include the Alabama Dance Council presenting *Philadanco*, the Birmingham Music Club presenting the *Warsaw Philharmonic*, Hindu Temple & Cultural Center presenting *Satmaarga: A Festival of Indian Jazz*, the Tennessee Valley Jazz Society presenting the *19th Annual Jazz-N-June Festival* and UAB/ Alys Stephens Center presenting the *Blind Boys of Alabama*.

The Council supports individual artists through the **Fellowship Program**, which recognizes and rewards the state's most promising and accomplished artists. These grants are awarded based on merit of work, career achievement, career potential and service to state. The Council considers applicants in dance, music and theatre. The five artists recognized in FY05 include the dancer, choreographer, and educator Rita Snyder; dancer, choreographer Lavondia Bryant Square; in music, Euphonium soloist, clinician, and educator Demondrae Thurman; composer, educator, Phillip Ratliff; and director, playwright and educator Barry Austin.



{Visual Arts}-----

The goal of the **Visual Arts Program** is to ensure that excellence, professionalism and multicultural expressions are available to Alabama audiences in the disciplines of painting, sculpture, crafts, printmaking, photography and film. The program supports the state's museums, exhibition spaces, art centers, artists and community projects with visual art and craft programming. It also provides technical assistance in exhibition organization and artist professional development.

Presenting grants allow organizations to bring exhibitions from other parts of the state, country or world, providing diverse experiences for the viewing audience. **Project grants** provide support to organize exhibitions, commission public artworks, provide art classes for both children and adults, include visual arts in community festivals, and offer a variety of opportunities for artists. Three institutions, Gulf ArtSpace and Space 301 in South Alabama and Space One Eleven in Birmingham sponsored exhibition opportunities for young contemporary artists, providing substantial experiences and educational opportunity for the general public as well. The Alabama Museums Association offered a variety of workshops and mentoring opportunities designed especially to help small museums. The Irondale Senior Center, St. Clair County Day Program, and Auburn Center for Arts and Humani-

ties. Prison Arts Project provided art classes for diverse audiences, all with significant success in building self-esteem and opportunity. The Sidewalk Moving Image Festival in Birmingham sponsored filmmaking and viewing for K-12 students as well as independent artists and the general public. The Gadsden Mary G. Hardin Cultural Arts Center established a glass blowing opportunity for professional artists as well as teachers and students in the area.

The Visual Arts Program also refers artists to juried exhibitions, festivals, and teaching opportunities as well as responding to public requests for artists with particular skills.

Operating Support grants provide unrestricted funds to the state's largest museums. To qualify, these organizations must have a three-year average cash income of at least \$500,000 and receive a percentage of this average. Art museums in Huntsville, Birmingham, Montgomery, and Mobile were funded under this component in fiscal year 2005 and provided

substantial exhibition programming with significant educational and community outreach.

The Alabama Craft Council is funded under a **Collaborative partnership** in the Visual Arts. The organization provides communication, education, and technical assistance to artists, also sponsoring the annual Alabama Clay Conference/Alabama Craft Conference. This past year, the Craft Council also provided technical assistance to artists to attend workshops, to create and exhibit new work. It created a variety of partnership programs in film and other craft media.

The Council provides **Artist Fellowships** to individuals in the visual arts based on merit of work, career achievement, career potential and service to the state. These fellowships allow artists to create and exhibit new work. 2005 recipients were Annie Kammerer Butrus and Marilee Keys in visual arts; Dale A. Lewis and John Phillips in craft; and Pamela Venz in photography.

The Alabama Artists Gallery presented seven exhibitions in the gallery space at the offices of the Council and organized two exhibitions for other spaces. These presentations bring visibility, promotion and career opportunities much needed by the state's artists. One of the exhibitions featured award-winning work from the Visual Arts Achievement Program.
